We rode the farm while he checked the right of ways and fences and he knew every inch of Sandy Creek and loved it all, it was in his blood. He loved sharing about the early days of the ranch and how it all came to be. The family he worked for were good solid people just like him. So many favorite memories of mine are there at the barn in all kinds of weather. His little pit was so seasoned and any kind of meat came out good. Ride high Jesse, all the horses are let out and all the cattle are put to pasture. It's time to rest from all your sunups and sundowns. I know the love of your life, Rosie was there to meet you. 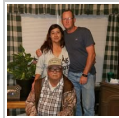

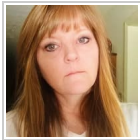

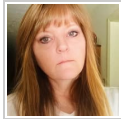
